## **AGM**

- We will have plenty to discuss and a new Secretary to appoint. Gerry has resigned as secretary but will continue to be a member of this association. That's great news as we have all benefitted from his vast experience during the past five years.
- After our successful application for funding from CNPA for our spring talk we have also received £1,800 funding from the People's Postcode Local Trust. This is for setting up an

association apiary for meetings and teaching. We would also like to make it available to potential beekeepers in the locality that might not be able to keep bees on their own premises. Your committee is presently trying to find a site for this, probably in the Aviemore area, which is central for our members. More news on this at the AGM.

- We have been offered a site for a heather apiary for anyone who would like to take his or her bees to the heather in July. It is on an estate near Grantown and Jim McCulloch and I will be taking a look at it in the spring to see whether it is suitable.
- Other things to be discussed will include setting up a website and designing a logo.
