

Equality Impact Assessment (EqIA) Initial Screening Form

Background

We have designed this assessment form to help our staff carry out equality impact assessments (EqIAs) on projects that they manage for us. Under new equalities laws, we have a legal duty to carry out EqIAs on all aspects of our work.

What is an EqIA?

An EqIA is a process of analysing a proposed or existing project (such as a policy, a service, a facility, research, a management paper, building or access work, an event or a publication). The aim is to identify any discriminatory or negative effects or impacts the project could have on a particular group or sector of the community or workforce. These effects could be as a result of people's race, disability, sex, age, religion or beliefs, or sexuality (referred to throughout as 'equality groups'). The outcome of the EqIA is to make sure that we prevent or limit, as far as possible, any negative effects or barriers our projects have. We also use the EqIA to take full advantage of any opportunities for promoting equality. **NB** Separate from EqIA, CNPA has a wider commitment to social inclusion and developing a Park for All, by positively supporting three groups namely people with disabilities, people on low incomes, and young people.

Why do we have to do them?

Under the Human Rights Act 1998, public authorities must not carry out any act which could be classed as discrimination. Organisations in the public sector are expected to show a clear respect for equality and human rights when carrying out their functions. When providing services and developing policies and procedures, public authorities have a vital role to play in promoting the values and practices of a fair and democratic society.

The Race Equality Duty (2002), the Disability Equality Duty (2006) and the Gender Equality Duty (2007) give us a responsibility to carry out EqIAs on all our current and proposed projects. Age, sexuality and religion or beliefs are currently covered by employment law only. However, as best practice, you should include these equality groups as part of all the EqIAs you carry out.

What do I do now?

As part of the process of planning your project – in the same way that you would fill out an Expenditure Justification Form (for example) – you should carry out an initial screening to check whether the project is relevant to the equality groups. You should not start work on your project until you have filled in the Initial Screening form.

When do I need to do a full EqIA?

The Initial Screening form will tell you whether you need to complete a full EqIA, which will be the case if the project is likely to have a significant effect on one or

The MIR is a consultative document, the purpose of which is to set out general proposals for development in the National Park, and in particular identify where development should and should not occur. It is a key tool in engaging communities in the work to progress the LDP. The results of the consultation on the MIR will directly feed into the content of the LDP. **Target audiences:**

- Generic Equalities Impact Assessments carried out for publications (which provides evidence for the publication of the document itself), and websites (which provides evidence for any web based material associated with the Plan).

The MIR is a consultative document with an overall aim to provide an opportunity to all citizens and stakeholders to become involved in the consultation and benefit from it. It includes options for policies and development sites. It is anticipated that the 'disability' and 'age' target groups could benefit from specific design solutions on the identified sites to meet their needs. The 'age' target group includes all ages, as each has its own quite specific requirements. This will be taken forward into the preparation and development of the LDP.
