Background

The Active Cairngorms Action Plan is one of a series of plans that sit below the National Park Partnership Plan and describe specific activities that will be undertaken by the Park Authority to support the delivery of the National Park Partnership Plan objectives. The Active Cairngorms Action Plan complements the Sustainable Tourism and Strategic Tourism Infrastructure Plans, which collectively describe the Park Authority and partners work in relation to the tourism industry and the management of visitor impacts on the Park.
