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	Experience	

Purpose

To update the Board on the submission of the Stage 2 application to the Heritage Lottery Fund for the Tomintoul and Glenlivet Landscape Partnership.

Recommendations

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TOMINTOUL & GLENLIVET LANDSCAPE PARTNERSHIP – SUBMISSION OF STAGE 2 BID TO HERITAGE LOTTERY FUND – FOR INFORMATION

Strategic Context

- 1. The Tomintoul and Glenlivet Landscape Partnership is a proposed £3.6M programme to enhance the heritage of the 200 sq km project area delivering benefits to the community, businesses, visitors and nature. The Landscape Partnership is a major project which developed from the Tomintoul and Glenlivet Regeneration Strategy and the priority focus for this area set out in the current National Park Partnership Plan and CNPA's corporate plan. The Landscape Partnership seeks to complement the shorter-term actions already put in place by securing long term enhancement of the heritage assets and associated opportunities for the area's continued economic and social development.
- 2. The vision for the Partnership is:

Tomintoul & Glenlivet's hidden landscapes are revealed, shared and enjoyed by people living and visiting here. The natural and cultural landscape is managed to make the very best use of the resources available for sustaining wildlife and the fabric of the communities, now and in the future. New generations of people will be inspired to be employed in traditional activities as well as new land based businesses. We value and celebrate our hidden heritage, and are proud to promote our area as a distinctive and vibrant place within the Cairngorms National Park.

3. In September 2014, The Heritage Lottery Fund approved the Stage 1 bid, approving funds for a development phase and earmarking $\pounds 2.1M$ of funding pending a Stage 2 application.

Partnership

- 4. In addition to seeking Heritage Lottery Funding the Landscape Partnership has secured significant commitment and financial support from other partners. Funding partners include:
 - a) CNPA (£250,000 over 5 years)¹
 - b) The Crown Estate (£250,000 over 5 years)
 - c) Highlands and Islands Enterprise (£250,000 over 5 years)
 - d) Moray Council (£200,000 over 4 years)
 - e) Chivas Bros, Glenlivet Distillery (£25,000 over 5 years)

- 5. A wider range of partners are committed to lead individual projects within the programme including:
 - a) Tomintoul and Glenlivet Development Trust
 - b) The Crown Estate
 - c) CNPA
 - d) Cairngorms Learning Partnership
 - e) Historic Environment Scotland
 - f) Spey Catchment Partnership
 - g) RSPB Scotland
 - h) Scalan Association
 - i) Tomintoul & Glenlivet Primary Schools
 - j) Tomintoul and Glenlivet Wildlife Group
 - k) Glenlivet Public Hall

Development Phase 2015-16

- 6. Following the successful Stage I application, partnership funding was in place for a Development Officer, employed by CNPA and hosted by the Tomintoul and Glenlivet Development Trust. The Development Officer, Marion McDonald, has co-ordinated development of the Stage 2 application, including feasibility studies, project briefs, community engagement and preparation of an overall 'Landscape Conservation Action Plan' which forms the core of the submission to the Heritage Lottery Fund.
- 7. There has been a high level of community engagement in developing the projects over this period. New groups such as the wildlife group have formed, new volunteers have come forward to develop projects and people have engaged in over 30 community events generating new project ideas.

Proposed Delivery Phase 2017-21 – Stage 2 application

- 8. The delivery phase is a four year programme from 2017-21, including a clear focus on creating a legacy that continues to support and shape the community beyond that period.
- 9. Annex I sets out a brief summary of each of the projects. Delivery will be led by a team of 6 new staff, based within the community. The employer function for the new staff will be shared between CNPA (3 posts including programme manager), Tomintoul & Glenlivet Development Trust (2 posts) and the Cairngorms Learning Partnership (1 post). This plays to the strengths of respective partners and in particular helps to build the capacity of the Development Trust.

10. The bid was submitted to HLF at the end of May and we anticipate it will be considered by the HLF committee in September.

Project Management

- 11. To date development of the Landscape Partnership has been overseen by a Partnership Board, chaired by CNPA. We are the lead applicant and as such have overall responsibility for the bid, HLF funding relationship and co-ordinating delivery. Assuming the Stage 2 bid is successful; the Partnership Board will continue to oversee delivery, though chaired by an independent chair rather than CNPA. CNPA will continue to have senior officer and board representation on the partnership board.
- 12. The Programme Manager will be responsible for the overall co-ordination of delivery supported by the staff team, while responsibility for individual projects lies with the lead partners identified in the bid. CNPA is committed to providing financial management for the partnership including managing grant claims and overall cash flow.
- 13. Within CNPA this is identified as a major project requiring co-ordination of staff time across the directorates and multi-year funding, with the necessary oversight by management team and Heads of Service.
- 14. In the interim phase between submission of the bid in May and HLF's decision in September, we are retaining the project officer on a 2 day/week basis to maintain community engagement in the programme and ensure we are ready to start the delivery phase quickly following HLF's decision.

Strategic Risk Management

- 15. The Landscape Partnership has its own risk register in place monitoring a range of risks to delivery, overseen by the Partnership Board. The specific risk of uncertainty associated with changes to The Crown Estate in Scotland is identified in both the partnership and CNPA's strategic risk register. Mitigation is in place through clear confirmation of the Crown Estate's continuing commitment and ongoing liaison as the changes take place.
- 16. The programme includes contingency funding covering general contingency in addition to specific allocations for the major capital projects tailored to the appropriate levels.
- 17. There remains a risk that HLF do not approve funding at Stage 2. In that event the partnership remains strong enough to continue some of the projects, at a reduced scale and over a longer time frame, but there is no doubt the significant long term value of this co-ordinated programme for the area would be lost. However we have

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mitigated this as far as we can through development of a good bid and a strong partnership, with regular project checks with HLF securing their agreement that the bid is ready to be submitted.
