AngusGlensRangerBase

Background

- 1. GlenDollisasignificantvisitordestinationwithintheNationalPark receivingsome63,000visitorsperannum(6yraveragefrom1998 2003).AlthoughtotalvisitornumberstotheParkarebasedonmodels notcounts thisamountstosome5%oftheestimatedtotalvisitorsto thePark.
- 2. ThesiteiswithineasyaccessofPerth,DundeeandFife.Some 315,000peoplelivewithin90minutesdriveofGlenDoll.
- 3. TheroadendatGlenDollhasacarparkdevelopedbyFor estry CommissionScotland(FCS).Thisprovidesrelativelyeasyaccessto eightMunro's(mountainsover3000ft)andtothetraditionalroutes Jock'sRoadandCapelMounthroutesthroughthemountains.The existingforestpathnetworkhasbeenimprovedbyth eFCSand partnersinvolvedintheEasternCairngormsAccessProject(ECAP). RedCraigs,therockoutcropsSEofGlenDollcarpark,areapopular climbingvenue.
- 4. CorrieFeeNationalNatureReserve,managedbyScottishNatural Heritage,issome3.5km fromthecarpark.Locatedonthesouthern edgeoftheCairngorms,thisreserve(whichwasformerlypartof CaenlochanNNR),hasoneofthebestrangesofmountainsplantsand animalsinBritain.Thecorrieispopularallyearroundwithhillwalkers andi swell -knownforwinterclimbing.Itisbestknownforbeautiful alpineflowers,goldeneagleandmountainhares.
- 5. AngusCouncil, working in partnership with FCS, SNH and the Cairngorms Partnership, established a Ranger Services in Glen Dollin 1998 to provide visitor and sitemanagement. The service also receives European funding until December 2005.
- 6. TheRangerServiceiscurrentlybasedinBraedownieFarmHouse. Thisrentedaccommodationisoflowstandardandnotsuitablefor receptionofvisitors .TheapplicationbyAngusCouncilistobuildanew basetoreplaceBraedownie.

TheDevelopmentProposal

- 7. AngusCouncildevelopedapartnershipcomprisingSNH,FCSand CNPAtoassessthefeasibilityofdevelopinganewrangerbaseforthe GlensServi ce.RGAConsultantswereappointedtoundertakethe study.ThecontractwasletandpaidforbyAngusCouncil.
- 8. Duringthediscussionsabouttheproposednewfacilityanumberof issuesweredifficulttoresolve,asdescribedinparagraphsbelow.

LocationandCapacity

- NosinglesitewouldeffectivelycoverGlensProsen,ClovaandMark.A baseatDykeheadwouldcoverGlensProsenandClovabutnotGlen Mark.
- 10. TherewasastrongsteerfromAngusCouncil,FCSandSNHthatthe visitorpressuresandt hesitemanagementneedsatGlenDollmeant thatthebaseneededtobelocatedinthatarea.Themanagement needsoftheNNRwereasignificantfactorinthisdiscussion.CNPA askedforotherlocationstobeconsideredbutafterfurtherinvestigation itwa sfeltthatabaseatGlenClovawouldnotreducepressuresat GlenDoll,andthatvisitorswouldsimplybypassthefacilityorstopfora shorttimeandmoveonuptheglen.AlocationatClovawouldhinder siteandvisitormanagementatGlenDoll.Howeve r,theDolllocation wouldnotprecludetherangersworkingintheotherglens,itwould simplyaddtojourneytime.
 - 11. Thecapacityofthesingletrackroadtocaterforfurthertraffic hasbeenacontinualconcernbutitwasfeltthatthebasewasnot beingdevelopedtoencouragemorevisitorsbuttobettermeetthe needsoftheexistingvisitors. GlenDollaveragessome63,000visitors peryearwithapeakof75,000in1999.RGAestimatefrompopulation modellingthatthemaximumnumberofvisitorslik elytovisitinanyyear is84,000. However, theydonotconsiderthatthedevelopmentofa newbasewillleaddirectlytoanincreasebecausethefactorsaffecting peoplesdecisiontovisitarealreadyinplacee.g. carpark, toilets, picnicarea, waymar kedwalks, goodsceneryetc. The Ranger Service willneedtobecarefulinpromotion of their activities that they do not attract further visitors to the site.
- 12. TheimpactofNationalParkdesignationandsignageonvisitor numbersisanintangible.

Function

13. Initialdiscussionshadlookedatdevelopingarangerbasewith combinedoutdooreducation,dormitoryandresidentialfacilitiesfor staff.CNPAstaffadvisedagainstsuchasignificantfacilityatthesite andthepartnersagreedthatasma llerbasecoveringtheexisting rangerfunctionswasmoreappropriate.However,itwasagreedthat theabilitytohaveagroupspaceforeducationalworkwasdesirable.

Design

14. Allagreedthatthedesignshouldbetoahighstandardandexplicitly sustainable. The facility should interpret the special qualities of the area and this should be reflected in the design as well as internal displays. The design should enhance the area.

AssessmentagainsttheNationalParkAims

ConserveandEnhancethe NaturalandCulturalHeritage

15. Themanagementfunctionscarriedoutbytherangerserviceonthe NNR,Glendollforestandassociatedfootpathsareconsidered essentialbythepartners.Therangerservicewasestablishedin1998 tomeetaneedidentifi edbySNH,FCSandAngusCouncil.Thatneed stillexists.

PromoteSustainableUseofNaturalResources

- 16. Thevisitormanagementroleandpromotionofresponsibleaccessby therangersisaimedatencouragingvisitorstousetheareaina sustainablew ay. Thisworkincludesactivities from the mundaneneed to ensure that litter is not left in the formal carparkarea to the more subtlemessages about low impact camping and wild life disturbance. This input is needed at an at ionally designated site that eceives such high visitor numbers.
- 17. Therangerbasehasbeendesignedasanexemplarofcurrentbest practiceinsustainabledesign.Interpretationofthisdesignwillbea featureofthebuilding.
- 18. Thedesignrationalisestheexistingstructures inthecarparkand createsanewtoiletfacilitythatcanbeopenwhilethebuildingis unstaffed.

PromoteUnderstandingandEnjoymentofSpecialQualities

- 19. Thepromotionofunderstandingandenjoymentareaisaprime functionofboththerangerserv iceandthebuilding. Thelocationatthe 'head'ofthecarparkwillensurethatallvisitorstothesitewillclearly havethechancetofindoutmoreaboutthespecialqualitiesofthe area. Thebuildingisdesignedsothatorientation, informationand interpretation will be available to the visitor without a directin put from staff.
- 20. However, the location of the base in the carpark will ensure that the rangers have a higher profile with visitors. The current base is tucked away from the public.

21. Thegroupmeetingareaintheproposedbasewillallowtheserviceto provideawiderrangeofeducationalprogrammestovisitinggroups.

SustainableEconomicandSocialDevelopment

- 22. RGAidentifiedthatanydevelopmentofthisscaleisunlikelytoh avea largeeconomicimpactparticularlywhenitwasdesignedtobettermeet theneedsofvisitorsratherthanincreasecapacity. Thereislikelytobe someincomegeneration from salesofsmallitems and an increase in collection of carparktickets. The latter will be achieved by an onsite presence encouraging greater adherence rather than any increase in price or visitor numbers.
- 23. Thebasewillalsohavea'miniTIC'functionindisseminatingvisitor informationabouttheGlens.Thisislikelytoen couragegreaterspend locally.

ParkforAll

- 24. GlenDolliswithin90minutesdriveofsome125,700peopleACORN profiledasof'moderatemeans'or'hardpressed'.Thisindicatesthatit isoneoftheareasoftheParkthatisaccessibletoalargenumb erof lesswelloffpeople.Lackofgoodpublictransportlinksmakethe journeytoGlenDolldifficultbutanecdotalevidenceindicatesthatthe siteispopularwithlessaffluentvisitorsfromDundee.
- 25. Thebuildingisdesignedtoalloweasyaccessf orall.

ConclusionandRecommendation

- 26. ThereisaclearneedforacontinuedrangerserviceintheAngus GlensandtherolethattheyplaywithintheParkwillpartofthewider reviewthatisongoing.Thecurrentrangerbaseiscompletely inadequateandreceptionfacilitiesforsuchalargenumberofvisitorsat thesiteareverypoor.Thereisaneedforbothintensivesiteandvisitor managementatGlenDoll.Whilearangerpresenceisrequired elsewhereintheGlensthedemandsarenotascritical asatDoll.The locationofthefacilityatGlenDollwillprovidesomechallengesifthe rangerservicearetoworkmorewidelyacrosstheGlensbutthe currentproposalisconsideredthebestsolutionintermsofmeeting partners'aspirations,providin gforvisitors'needsandlocatingthe rangerswheremostworkisrequired..
- 27. VSRGsupportthedevelopmentoftheproposedbaseandfeelthatit amplymeetstheaimsoftheNationalPark.Thedevelopmenthasgreat potentialforpromotingunderstanding andenjoymentofthespecial qualitiesoftheParktoapopulationwhowouldnotvisitotherareasof thePark.
