Quote from the R.S.P.B. - "Insh Marshes National Nature Reserve is one of the most important wetlands in Europe. Enjoy a springtime stroll along our nature trails and look out for nesting lapwings, redshanks, and curlews. Or visit in the wintertime when the marsh floods to provide the ideal habitat for visiting flocks of whooper swans and greylag geese.

Insh Marshes is a training centre for environmental conservation, and we aim to encourage more trainees and volunteers to become qualified. We are also working with local schools and Wildlife Explorer groups to encourage environmental education for children. Meanwhile, we are promoting the reserve to key audiences as a good example of natural floodplain management".

# Cairngorm National Park Aims are:

- "a. to conserve and enhance the natural and cultural heritage of the area.
- b. to promote sustainable use of the natural resources of the area.
- c. to promote understanding and enjoyment (including enjoyment in the form of recreation) of the special qualities of the area by the public.
- d. to promote sustainable economic and social development of the area's communities".

# Fobject to the above planning application on the following grounds:

1. Impact on the local environment.

This application would be an intrusion into a tranquil rural area, as described above, with an inadequate infra structure to accommodate 6 residential units with the resultant number of cars which could be approx. 12. They would produce noise and pollution into an area dedicated to nesting birds, visiting birds and a rich variety of wild life including a small herd of roe deer. The area is also set up for visiting birds and has a network of rural walks.

2. Impact on existing access.

This is of major concern for the following reasons:

a. junction access with the B970 main road is inadequate for the proposed

increase in usage for 6 new dwellings.

b. the access track connecting with the main road B970 is substandard for the proposed increase in usage for 6 new dwellings. It is a single track, rough road only just suitable for the existing traffic produced by a working farm, R.S.P.B. vehicles and those from my residence. For safe passage this would have to be upgraded by widening the access on to the main road, create passing places and its length bottomed and covered with tarmac. Its gradient and lack of positive drainage results in rain water, together with the run off from fields, cascading down and creating erosion in the area. There is no way this road in its present state will accommodate all that will be necessary to build the site as planned at present. It will be unable to accommodate the number of vehicles required to service the site after completion - i.e. fuel tankers, sewerage tankers, removal/delivery vans etc. Refuse collection vehicles - if bins are to be left at the road side this would need to be taken into consideration when widening access to the main road. 14 wheelie bins parked on the road verge could cause a major obstruction. When the Planning Department last granted outlying planning permission there was a condition laid down that the developer would be required to widen the access onto the main road and the single track road would be upgraded to a tarmac road with passing places.

I hope this condition will be enforced when the new planning application comes before the planning committee. The gradient is such that the rain water from the fields runs down the track washing away the aggregate. The level of the road is above that of the verges, except at the field entrances.

- c. I also understand that the developer wishes to close off or divert the existing track to the River Tromie. I have enjoyed unrestricted access along this track for in excess of 12 years. I object to any closure or diversion of the section through this site.
- 3. Further to the above I am concerned that:
- a. all Rights of Way must be maintained at all times.
- b. the Right of Access to the Tromie River by way of the existing track will remain open to all.
- c. that the Developer will take responsibility for the upkeep of the track to the main road.
- d. my gateway must never be obstructed in any way at any time.
- e. that as my farmhouse is closely associated to this proposed development and shares in some elements I must be kept informed at all times of details involving sewage and road access both existing and new.
- f. I must have a plan showing the line of the proposed fence and the position of the gate.

I therefore object to the above proposed development because of its huge impact on an area designated by two major authorities to the care of wildlife. Also the danger that would result from a massive increase in its use with grossly inadequate access.



CENTRE POINT: X=278,000 Y=800,000 | MAP SCALE: 1:25000

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
