Park's training boost for young people

Two innovative training projects for young people are getting underway in the Cairngorms National Park in the construction and land based business sectors.

The Cairngorms Construction Training Project is a three year initiative which has been developed to meet several challenges in the Park namely employment, training, affordable housing and sustainable construction and is funded by Cairngorms Local Action Group LEADER Fund, Scottish Government and the CNPA.

The Highland Small Communities Housing Trust (HSCHT) has recruited a project officer to work with 15 unemployed young people (16 - 25) who will receive a recognised qualification through Inverness College on successful completion of their training, which will cover a wide range of construction skills. HSCHT will also provide the site where the houses will be built, ensuring some valuable on the job training.

In addition, the children's charity Barnardo's has teamed up with a range of partners to provide opportunities for the young people in the Cairngorms National Park who want to work on the land, but are having difficulty finding jobs. All participants will get some valuable training and make contacts in the sector. As well

as benefiting young people, Barnardo's Works Cairngorms - which is being piloted in Deeside will help land based businesses who need people to work for them but cannot find the skilled labour or the time to train them.

This nationally funded project is supported with significant funds from Cairngorms Local Action Group EU LEADER and the Department of Work and Pensions. It will be specifically working with young people who may be at risk of offending, leaving care or simply having no family support when looking for work. Each will have the opportunity to spend 6 months learning new skills with the farms and estates in the National Park and will receive the necessary support to secure permanent employment.

Education and Learning

New learning initiatives have been launched in the Park, bringing together outdoor learning with the virtual world. The Cairngorms National Park Authority (CNPA) has set up the Cairngorms Outdoor Learning Network (COLN), and working in partnership with Scottish Natural Heritage, has also unveiled the Cairngorms Learning Zone Website.

COLN is designed to make delivering outdoor learning easier for teachers and other leaders. The online resource gives them access to information such as contacts for outdoor learning providers, trainers, Continuous Professional Development courses and opportunities to share experiences. The CNPA is working

with schools and other interested parties to make sure that the Learning Zone meets their needs.

The Cairngorms Learning Zone contains a range of information on all aspects of the Park. It is aimed at secondary school pupils studying subjects such as geography, history, geology and environmental studies at Higher and Advanced Higher level. It is the most comprehensive online educational resource about the Park and can be used for all aspects of study and is also proving to be a useful tool in preparation for field trips for outdoor learning.

Furthermore, a new resource pack 'Getting Into Scotland's National Parks and National Nature Reserves' has also been published to support visits by schools and other groups. It contains lots of useful information, advice, ideas and contacts to overcome the barriers to engaging with National Parks and NNRs.

Leading the way

LEADER funding for projects is still available with over £700,000 to be committed before the programme ends in 2013.

The Cairngorms Local Action Group (LAG) is keen to hear from groups with good ideas, especially those with a focus on young people.

Patricia Methven, Grants Manager with the Cairngroms LAG explained: "The Cairngorms Local Action Group was established in the Park in June 2002 with the first Park wide LEADER+ Programme. The Local Action Group, which is 50 per cent community based, works hard to encourage many diverse communities of interest to apply to the scheme for funding support. Projects supporting young people into work are coming forward at the moment and it is hoped to build on these projects during the remainder of the Programme."

With Highland Perthshire expected to join the Cairngorms National Park in October, the LAG will be working more closely with the Rural Tayside Local Action Group. Tayside will still fund projects in this area or joint activities between LAGs may be developed.

To date, the Cairngorms LAG has helped 145 projects and committed £1.4m.

EV travels the **Park**

You may have seen the electric car around the west side of the Park driven by volunteers from the Badenoch & Strathspey Community Transport Company (B&SCTC). Its eye catching paint job means you can't really miss it!

A converted Vauxhall Astra, the electric vehicle (EV) can reach 60mph, has a 100 mile range and charges up for around ¹/10th of the cost of a petrol car, demonstrating too how communities can share a resource like a car.

The EV and its trailer-mounted wind turbine will be at various summer events including the Grantown Show this summer if anyone wants to have a closer look. School

pupils are also being invited for a test drive and to learn more about the alternatives to oil fuelled cars.

The project has financial support from the EU, UHI Millennium Institute's Centre for Mountain Studies, CNPA, Community Energy Scotland, HITRANS and the Climate Challenge Fund.

As part of the International Year of Biodiversity celebrations, one of Scotland's largest ever wildlife recording events took place in May. Grantown-on-Spey, Kingussie and Ballater took part in the 24-hour Big BioBuzz Day with hundreds of people getting involved in identifying the wildlife on their doorstep from dawn till dusk.

Cabinet Secretary for Rural Affairs and the Environment Richard Lochhead and his family visited the Grantown event, accompanied by CNPA Convener David Green.

Mr Lochhead said: "It was absolutely fantastic to see so many people out enjoying everything that the Cairngorms National Park has to offer. Everyone's efforts to collect as much

information as possible on biodiversity shows the great variety of plants and animals that we have in Scotland, whether that's in our national parks, local woods or our gardens."

Stephen Corcoran, the Cairngorms Biodiversity Officer, said: "What a superb day with people of all ages involved, locals and visitors alike. It raised the profile of just how much biodiversity is next door to where people live."

who was involved in running the Ballater event added: "The event has increased our knowledge of the biodiversity found in and around Ballater. It was also the first time nearly all the Ranger Services from across the Park have worked together on a project,



which was a great experience."

National **Dragonfly** Atlas

The third survey season for the new dragonfly atlas for Britain is underway - more records are needed from Scotland.

The 2008 and 2009 survey seasons saw records for only 17 per cent of 10 kilometre squares in Scotland compared

to 43 per cent in England and 65 per cent in Wales. There is now a handy new guide 'Damselflies & Dragonflies of the Cairngorms' available to help you identify and record dragonflies.

Make your WILDLIFE RECORDINGS

The CNPA has produced a recording booklet to help encourage people to record the amazing wildlife of the Cairngorms. We are looking for people to record all the



species that they see from hedgehogs, squirrels and frogs to ospreys, butterflies and pine martens. We want everything

- not just the rarer species!

It is crucial to gather records on species within the National Park as it provides information on the distribution and population levels, which will help the effective management of the species.

Recording booklets can be obtained from the CNPA offices in Grantown and Ballater as well as ranger bases throughout the park and participating Tourist Information Centres.

ACTION for **RARE PLANTS**

Compared to feathered, furry and six-legged creatures, plants often struggle to get their fair share of attention but all that is about to change! The Cairngorms Rare Plants Project aims to conserve four rare species in the Cairngorms National Park:

- Twinflower (Linnaea borealis)
- Intermediate wintergreen (Pyrola media)
- Small cow-wheat (Melampyrum sylvaticum)
- Lesser butterfly orchid (Platanthera bifolia)

"All of these plants have undergone significant declines in the UK", said Andy Scobie, Project Officer. He is working closely with partner organisations, land managers and local botanists to develop and implement beneficial management action for these plants. Andy is currently surveying target sites and this information will help establish which populations of the plants are most at risk and the potential steps that can be taken to rectify this. Members of the public are asked to get involved in the project by reporting sightings of target species or volunteering to monitor local rare plant populations.

The project is funded by the Esmee Fairburn Foundation, the CNPA, SNH via the Species Action Framework, and in-kind contributions from the University of Aberdeen.

Community Needs Initiative

The next wave of community action planning is hitting the National Park with Aviemore, Rothiemurchus, Kincraig and Alvie now going through the process with help from Voluntary Action Badenoch and Strathspey.

This follows on from the work that has been done in Dalwhinnie and Newtonmore which resulted in the provision of community notice boards, improved gateway signage in Kingussie and in Laggan - with funding support from Highland Council, CNPA and charitable contributions - improvements to the pond and picnic area.

In Deeside and Donside a development manager has been recruited to assist the delivery of the next stage of community action planning there. Funded by LEADER, Aberdeenshire Council, Ballater Royal Deeside and the Park Authority, their role will be to support emerging projects in these areas.

Community action planning in Tomintoul and Glenlivet is planned for later in 2010.

Dotterel on Cairngorms

Raising a family on the **extremes**

It's been a long cold winter and even now, icy weather retains its grip on the mountain plateau.

One of our rarest breeding birds, the dotterel, is a summer visitor who comes here and raises its broods on these high mountain tops. If you are walking up on the tops, you will often see them as they are quite 'tame' birds with a striking plumage. They are also one of the

most unusual in that the male is the main 'child carer' and takes responsibility for incubating the eggs and raising the chicks.

As well as contending with cold weather and watchful predators, people and their dogs can unwittingly interfere with a successful breeding season. That huge open space over which your dog is running may contain well-hidden nests, and even the best behaved dog may drive the adults away and expose the eggs and young to the harsh environment.

Whilst you are out walking you may come across signs asking you to keep your dog under proper control, through areas where these birds are known to nest - in doing so you and your dog will be helping the survival of this unique and fascinating bird.

Grantown to St Pancras

I was recently updated by John Partridge and Bert Nicolson the new Project Manager on the progress being made by the 'Rails to Grantown Project'.

Over the years I have been very impressed by the tremendous hard work and commitment of John and the team of approximately 140 volunteers who have kept the present steam railway between Grantown and Broomhill in operation and enjoyed by many tourists and visitors alike. John is planning to stand down as Chairman of the SRC, but his energy and drive have left the next phase of the restoration of the railway to Grantown very well placed to make sound progress.

However, this is not just an extension from Aviemore to Grantown.

It is a sustainable transport link between one of the main Highland resorts and a beautiful historical town which would benefit from economic regeneration.

As a journey it will be one of the top attractions on the British Rail Network.

It will be this and more as a transformational project which will bring economic, social, educational and cultural benefits to the Cairngorms National Park.

That is why the CNPA has given its support in principle and has and will lend what assistance it can. Likewise the project has received significant cross party political support clearly evidenced at the packed public meeting in Grantown last year.

The challenge is big in terms of funding and a host of other issues, but the opportunities this will bring are even bigger so that for instance folk from Grantown and the wider hinterland can have rail access to St Pancras and onward with Eurostar to Paris - though I still think the shopping is better in Grantown!
