THE CAIRNGORMS NATIONAL PARK
IS MADE UP OF A UNIQUE MOSAIC OF HABITATS OF VERY HIGH QUALITY,
and **exceptional size and scale.** It is a **stronghold** for **British wildlife**, including many of the UK's rare and **endangered species**, and those at the limit of their range.

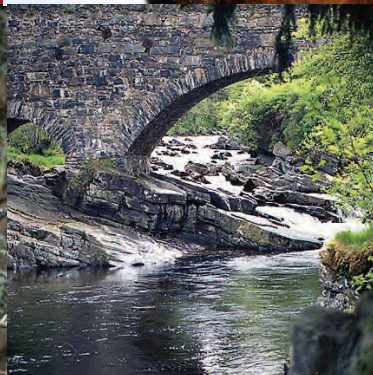


High above **Loch Etchachan**, the sun catches the pink petals of creeping azalea.

Down in the forest, amongst the lichen covered pines, the **Scottish wildcat** hunts.



The National Park contains some of the best wildlife habitats in the UK. Ancient pine forests, arctic mountain tops, lochs, rivers and moorlands are home to a quarter of the UK's threatened species.



At the top of the glen a **red deer** stag is grazing. The river starts to slow at **Feshie Bridge**. A **red squirrel** looks for food in the tree tops.

Separated by the **great bulk** of the mountains, different areas have their own **distinct identity and cultural traditions**, but they share **deep connections** to the same environments. The Park is a place of '**mountain folk**' and '**forest folk**'.
