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Community Heritage Boost

The heritage of the Cairngorms National Park's communities is going straight to the top of the agenda with the appointment of a new Community Heritage Officer.

Fiona McLean was appointed in August and is working with communities in the Park to help develop and realise their

cultural heritage ambitions. Emphasis is being placed on cultural heritage projects which fit within three themes: land use, languages and routes, with these themes having been identified as the most significant and therefore providing a focus for the next two years.

Land use, languages and routes have particular relevance in the Cairngorms National Park and have played a key part in the cultural heritage of the area. However, Fiona is keen to stress that she is also happy to advise on projects which do not fit within these themes but which are still of relevance to the National Park.

Fiona said: "There is an inextricable relationship between the Cairngorms landscape and the people who have lived here and one of my key aims is to make the connections between people and place in the Park and to highlight the significance of human impact on the landscape we see today."

Based in Grantown-on-Spey, one of Fiona's first tasks is

to organise a community heritage conference bringing together community members to share their experiences of cultural heritage projects and to hear from national and other organisations about the opportunities for support and collaboration. This event is scheduled for summer 2010.

encouraging people to pick up after their dog

- FARMING AND STOCK ISSUES helping dog owners to understand the impact their dog can have on livestock
- NATURAL HERITAGE ISSUES understanding the impacts on wildlife, particularly during the breeding season for ground nesting birds

The campaign hopes to raise awareness of these issues with people who own and walk dogs and ultimately to influence their behaviour when out with their dogs to ensure a National Park that can be enjoyed by all.

The Cairngorms Local Outdoor Access Forum (LOAF) has been getting to grips with the glitzy world of movie making!

In partnership with the Macaulay Institute, LOAF members have been making a film about dogs in the countryside and in true roving reporter mode, have been busy interviewing members of the public, estate owners and farmers to find out their views.

The short film can then be used at future events and exhibitions to highlight why it is important to keep your dog under control when enjoying the countryside.

WOODFUEL is the future

Wood is fast gaining recognition as the fuel of the future and now householders and businesses in the Cairngorms National Park are getting a helping hand to discover smart, sustainable ways to keep warm.

With a plentiful supply on our doorsteps, using wood to heat buildings makes total sense. Rather than being at the mercy of bouncing oil prices, people can rely on having cheaper heating costs and burning logs, wood chips or pellets does not add to global warming. The amount of carbon dioxide absorbed by a growing tree is the same as that released when it's burned.

The Cairngorms National Park Authority is working with partners to organise a series of specialist training courses for landowners, businesses and householders in order to boost both supply and demand for woodfuel in the Cairngorms National Park. The project is backed by Clim-ATIC, an EU funded

Significant funds are still available until the end of 2013, in some cases funding support can amount up to 95% of

The residents of Dalwhinnie, Laggan, Kingussie and Newtonmore are currently going through this planning process with assistance from Voluntary Action Badenoch and Strathspey. This builds on the experiences of 'Our Community A Way Forward' - the pilot initiative which kicked community action planning off and which will have reached all communities in the Cairngorms National Park by the end of 2012.

In Aberdeenshire there has been progress on some important actions in Ballater where the 'Ballater One Voice Our Future' community consultation has been completed. These include improving NHS dental care in Ballater, enhancing facilities at the Victoria and Albert Halls and developing activities and

facilities for young people.

Junior RANGERS

The Cairngorms National Park Junior Ranger Project was launched in June 2009, involving 21 young people aged 12-15 in two five day programmes - one in Deeside and one in Strathspey.

The programme took biodiversity, outdoor access and visitor management as its themes and activities were set up to fully explore these in the context of the Park. All Junior Rangers achieved the John Muir Discovery Award.

Insh Marshes National Nature Reserve, CairnGorm Mountain and the River Spey were the wild places visited by the Strathspey Junior Rangers. Activities included moth recording, footpath maintenance and first hand experiences of outdoor access issues whilst canoeing down the River Spey. An added bonus for two of the Junior Rangers was to walk up CairnGorm with Ben Fogle for a future BBC 'Country Tracks' programme and share their experiences with him.

Over on 'the other side of the hill', Mar Lodge Estate, Burn o' Vat, Loch Muick and the mighty River Dee formed the backdrop for activity. The Deeside Junior Rangers worked hard digging out ditches and marking deer fences to help avoid bird strikes from black grouse, as well as exploring the pinewoods of Glen Quoich. They met ghillies from Glen Tanar Estate whilst canoeing on the River Dee to discuss outdoor access issues around salmon fishing.

The Junior Ranger project is set to expand in 2010, details will be publicised in the New Year.

Planning ENFORCEMENT Charter

The CNPA has produced a new Planning Enforcement Charter which outlines how the planning enforcement process works.

The Park's residents have an important role to play in the monitoring of planning control and conditions and this charter should give them confidence to know how to contact the CNPA with any concerns regarding unauthorised development or construction that does not comply with the conditions of planning permission.

Examples of concern might be new tracks across moorland; demolition of a building or operations that would affect a listed building. The charter will be available at both the Ballater and Grantown-on-Spey offices and electronically on the CNPA website, early in 2010.

The Green outlook

Delivering the Park Plan for the Cairngorms National Park is a partnership effort. No one group or organisation is responsible for making everything happen but it's not just public sector bodies that are involved in the delivery of the Park Plan, businesses, community organisations and even individuals have a role to play.

For this reason, a new body is emerging in the Park - the Cairngorms Business Partnership is bringing together the Destination Marketing Organisations, the Chamber of Commerce and others into one more financially sustainable, efficient, effective organisation that will strengthen the business voice in the Park and ensure that the private sector is better placed to capitalise on the economic potential of the Cairngorms National Park.

'Making Tourism & Business More Sustainable' is a priority for action in the National Park Plan and the private sector is crucial to delivering key elements of this work, supported by the likes of the Park Authority and Highlands and Islands Enterprise.

The benefits of the Cairngorms Business Partnership - which is due to be launched officially in April 2010 - is that they are best placed to harness Park-wide marketing opportunities and maximise the potential business value offered by National Park status. I for one very much look forward to working with the business community in its new guise and wish the Cairngorms Business Partnership every success.

Strategic Review

One of the conclusions of the Scottish Government's Strategic Review of Scotland's National Parks is for a cut in the number of board members from 25 to 19.

The mix of locally elected, ministerial appointed and council nominated board members will remain to help ensure local and national accountability as well as a balance of skills and experience. The number of locally directly elected members will remain at five. Of the seven council nominated members Angus, Moray and Perth and Kinross Councils will each nominate one member, and Aberdeenshire and Highland councils will each nominate two members. The remaining seven members will be appointed directly by Scottish Government Ministers. The changes are expected to take place by October 2010.

Local Plan

The Reporter's recommendations (following the Public Inquiry which took place in the summer) are expected to be with us before the end of the year. We will have to consider the recommendations and report to the Planning Committee early in 2010 along with any proposed post inquiry modifications. We will then consult on any modifications and follow the statutory process to adoption (expected autumn 2010).

Core Paths Plan

New paths are already being built and old ones improved as a result of core paths planning in the Cairngorms National Park. Thanks to everyone who got involved in the process. The Core Paths Plan was submitted to Ministers in March 2009 and was then subject to a Local Inquiry.
